August and September Highlights

After the best summer for a long time, Autumn is officially here. The dry and dusty paths are now just a memory as the rain and mud returns. However do not fear, our **Trampers** are more than capable of tackling wet and muddy conditions and now is the time to get out to enjoy the wonderful autumn colours at any of the Countryside Mobility (CMSW) sites.



There are now 5 CMSW partner sites hiring Trampers to our members:

- Durlston Country Park
- Berry Head National Nature Reserve
- Haldon Forest Park
- Siblyback Lake
- Stover Country Park

Over 50 people have now joined the scheme and have been using our Trampers which is great news. Feedback from members on the membership application process and the training provided by site staff has been excellent and has also helped us improve the way we do things.

A press release sent out at the beginning of September resulted in some good media coverage including a mention in the **Daily Telegraph**. We have also recently distributed 10,000 flyers across the region to help more people find out about us.

Devon County Council's Public Rights of Way team have also provided funding to help us operate a Tramper on the 12km (7 mile) long **Granite Way** near Okehampton. Thanks to this funding we are now working with **Devon Cycle Hire** and hope to have a Tramper there for hire in the Spring.

We have also been busy with disability access audits at sites that will be joining the scheme early next year - see page 2 for more details.

The project Steering Group which helps shape the project also met for the third time in September.

New Sites Coming Soon...



Disability Access Audits



Access Auditing

Access auditing ensures that our partner sites comply as reasonably as possible with the Disability Discrimination Act and that paths and trails are suitable and safe to be used by Tramper users.

'd4', the training and consultancy division of Living Options Devon, undertake our access audits with CMSW staff and site managers. The fully-qualified and experienced auditors we work with have physical disabilities themselves and use Trampers to undertake the audits.

The audits look at site features and facilities such as, parking, cafés, signs, information boards, maps, toilets, visitor centres, as well as path surfaces, gates and other potential barriers. On many sites, small scale improvements are often required to improve accessibility.

The First CMSW Wheelyboat is delivered

The first CMSW funded MKIII Wheelyboat has been delivered to **Tamar Lakes** near Bude, Cornwall and will be available to hire by CMSW members next spring. Funding for this boat was also provided by the Environment Agency and the Cornwall Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty Sustainable Development fund.

The MKIII is the latest bow-loading Wheelyboat model and is the most versatile to date. It's larger than the previous models meaning that it is capable of carrying up to 5 people. It is perfectly suited for pleasure boating and nature watching as well as angling.

This Wheelyboat is operated by South West Lakes Trust (SWLT) and will cost £30 to hire for half a day or £45 to hire for a full day. The price includes fuel and a 20 minute training and safety session.

Exmoor Guided Tramper Trips

The trips, starting in 2011, will be planned and routes audited by National Park Authority and CMSW staff to ensure they are suitable and safe for use by people using our Trampers.
